History of Commedia dell'arte

Commedia dell'arte originated mid-16th Century in Italy with companies travelling with ten or so players. They performed stock characters that were instantly recognisable and drawn from the levels of status within society. Characters were driven by basic human desires such as hunger, greed, sex, love etc. All the emotions that are still alive within us today and still instantly recognisable with all the foibles attached and that is why it is as funny today as it ever was.

Go to the National Theatre website for a full explanation and list of Commedia characters. A video film by Didi Hopkins – an inspiring authority on the genre – explains it wonderfully and there is everything you could possibly want to know about the making of this play.

An example of a classic Commedia dell'arte scenario "Zanni and the walnuts" Commedia companies were run by the actors in the company. They were very democratic and performances were based around a stock set of very specific scenes. Zanni and the walnuts is just one example of a classic scene with the potential for the actors to devise a huge amount of comic character business from the scenario.

Scene 1. Master enters very excited with the letter that has just arrived. He opens it and reads it and shares it with us. It goes from good news to bad. He is beside himself. Calls servant. Enter servant and the master gets him to deliver a box of pickled walnuts to the woman who lives over the hill. Exit master.

Scene 2. Servant goes off but gets tempted on way to eat one walnut. Then another and another in inventive ways until there are none left and suddenly the servant is scared of what he has done, so hides the evidence or destroys it and goes back home to the master — ready to lie. At that moment....

Scene 3. The master enters, looking for the servant, out of breath and asks if he has delivered the walnuts.

"Yes," says the servant, "and I'm on my way home."

"Did she eat them?!"

"Yes," says the servant, "And her husband and the mayor and the mayor's wife."

At each answer from the servant, the master gets more and more agitated and upset and is convinced that he will be hung drawn and quartered.

"Why?" asks the servant.

"Because the walnuts were poisoned and she will die and so will the others," replied the master.

At which point the servant starts laughing. The master begins to describe what will happen to the woman – her eyes will pop out, her throat will get tight, she will start to lose her tongue.... As he goes through the horrid description, the same things start to happen to the servant. Eventually the master realises that the servant ate the walnuts and now he has the upper hand. Will the master give the antidote for the poison to the servant or will he make him suffer further as punishment?

Background

The original National Theatre production of this show is an adaptation of One Servant Two Masters, written by Goldoni in 1740s and set in Florence. One Man Two Guvnors is set in Brighton and keeps much of the original. High status characters from Goldoni's world such as the aristocracy are replaced with 1960s London and Brighton gangsters, who although not posh still have the power of life and death over low status characters such as servants.

Commedia is the source of great comedy throughout the ages: influencing Shakespeare, restoration comedy, Chaplin, Marx brothers, classic and current TV sitcoms: wherever there is a master/servant scenario. (Think Basil Fawlty and Manuel!!!)



Susannah Bance: Ensemble Susannah holds a LAMDA Acting Award and works with theatre classes for 5-10 year olds. Last year's Court Theatre appearances
